Chunky Knit Planter

Sorghum Gingerbread Pear Muffins

1 cup whole wheat flour

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 egg

1/2 cup buttermilk

1/2 cup sorghum

1/2 cup unsweetened applesauce

1 pear – peeled, cored and diced

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Grease 12 muffin cups or line with paper liners.
- 2. In a separate bowl, mix the flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, ginger and salt together.
- 3. In a separate bowl, stir in eggs, buttermilk, sorghum and unsweetened applesauce until smooth. Then mix this mixture into the flour mixture until batter is just moistened.
- 4. Peel, core and dice pear, and then gently fold it into the batter.
- 5. Fill the muffin cups with the mixture. They will be full.
- 6. Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted in the center of a muffin comes out clean, about 20 minutes.

Yield: 12 individual muffins.

Dear Henry County Homemakers & Friends:

Over the last several months 4-H'ers have enjoyed educational "grab bags" that they have been able to put together at home with a little help. After talking with Terry, the Homemaker President, we thought that homemakers might enjoy a few "grab bags" this summer. There are plans to create 3 different bags for the months of June, July, and August. The first grab bag will a beaded bracelet. The kit will include jewelry elastic, beads and spacers. We ask that everyone that picks up a kit take a picture of the completed project and share it on the Henry County Cooperative Extension Facebook page for all to enjoy.

The second kit will be a little more involved. It will be an upcycling project. You will need to save a soup or vegetable can for the base of your project. It will then be covered in modeling clay in a design that looks like a knitted pattern (pictured above) All of the clay is white, but it can be painted any color desired with acrylic paints after it has dried. Detailed instructions will be included in the bag.

The third item will be some type of home décor. We are still on the hunt for ideas, so if you have a good idea for a project please share it with us.

We plan to have 30 kits available for each project. Should there be enough supplies for more we will continue with kits as long as the supplies last per project. The "grab bags" will be available for pick up at the front of the office building in a large tote that will be marked on the last Monday of each month (June 29, July 27, & August 31) First come first served. **We will not be able to hold or reserve bags.**

The youth in the county have enjoyed their grab bags and hopefully those of you who choose to participate will too. Have a great summer!
